

## Help shape how the City can fund housing and community needs

The City of Austin invites community members to help guide a new five-year plan to invest housing and community development dollars where they are needed most. This Federal Funding Plan decides how to distribute approximately \$14 million in annual grant funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The public services and programs from this grant address things like affordable housing, job creation and public service needs for low- and moderate-income families, persons with disabilities and seniors.

The City of Austin's Planning Department is asking for the community's feedback on the draft Equity-Based Preservation Plan. The plan aims to help us learn from our past to shape a future for everyone, and we want to hear from many Austinites to make sure it reflects community priorities. The draft plan recommends preservation policies, programs and tools aimed at making Austin more equitable, inclusive and sustainable. It was developed by a community working group with 26 members from across Austin. The working group heard from many voices, and in total, more than 300 people helped shape the draft.

### Don't let distracted driving get the better of you

Distracted driving is deadly. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, 32,657 people died in distraction-affected crashes across the United States from 2012 to 2021. In 2021, 3,522 people were killed and an estimated additional 362,415 people were injured in crashes involving distracted drivers.



Texting while driving is a major cause, but so are adjusting the radio or GPS, applying makeup and eating and drinking at the wheel.

April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, and Austin is a Vision Zero city — that means we're committed to completely eliminating deaths and serious injuries on our roadways. Here are some tips to stay safe while driving:

- » If you must send a text, pull over to a safe location and park your car first.
- » If you have passengers, appoint a "designated texter" to handle all your texting.
- » If you can't resist the temptation to look at your phone, keep it in the trunk or program its settings to delay alert notifications until you are finished driving.

### Spring into action with Grow Green

Austin's lakes and waterways need our help! We can reduce pollution and harmful algae blooms by using natural gardening practices in our lawns and gardens. Avoid using synthetic weed and feed products — their ingredients can cause widespread water pollution. Instead of using fertilizers, improve your soil and plant health by adding nutrient-rich compost. Use native and adapted plants for Central Texas, which reduce the need for harmful landscaping chemicals like pesticides. ### The basics of short-term rentals in Austin

Development Services Department Code Compliance is a one-stop resource for short-term rental (STR) information and annual licensing. The STR licensing team is available to assist with and process applications for new STR licenses, STR license renewals and extension requests.

STRs — residential dwelling units or an accessory building rented on a temporary basis for periods of less than 30 consecutive days — fall into one of three categories: owner occupied, nonowner occupied or part of a multi-family residential use.
