Stay away from downed power lines

When high winds and storms roll through the area, it's good to be aware of potential hazards from downed power lines. Here are some important tips for staying safe:

- »Never touch a fallen power line.
- »Stay at least 35 feet away from a downed power line.
- » Never touch anything or anyone in contact with a power line, including tree limbs.
- » If you are driving and come across a downed line, keep your distance.
- »If your vehicle comes in contact with a downed power line, do not leave the vehicle.


 As long as it is safe to do so, wait for utility professionals to de-energize the line.

If you see a fallen power line or a tree limb touching a power line, call Austin Energy at **512-322-9100** to report the location. If you see a fallen power line on a vehicle or see someone touching a power line, call **911**.

Austin is in the heart of Flash Flood Alley, and some of our biggest floods have been in the spring. Stay safe during a flood by keeping off roads and flood-prone trails. If you must drive, remember to watch for water over the road and Turn Around, Don't Drown.

But driving isn't the only risk. There are also thousands of homes in Austin that are prone to flooding. Flooding can bring financial hardship. Clear the Way!

We've all seen it — overgrown trees and shrubs blocking our sidewalks and making it harder to navigate around town — but, did you know that property owners are responsible for maintaining areas of the right-of-way adjacent to their property? It's true! Remember to trim any private tree limbs, plants and other vegetation to 8 feet above the sidewalk and 14 feet above the street.
